RTI & Academics: Evidence-Based Interventions for Difficult-to-Teach Students

Students who struggle academically often require individualized interventions carefully tailored to their areas of academic deficit. This workshop is designed to give teachers, support staff, and administrators the necessary tools to plan and carry out effective academic interventions. Participants will review an essential checklist of 'foundation' academic instructional components, such as instructional match; clear, direct instruction; high rate of active student responding; and timely performance feedback. The training reviews three key academic domains: reading, mathematics, and writing. For each academic domain, participants learn about common 'stumbling blocks' that can prevent students from achieving success and review a sampling of effective, classroom-friendly, research-based intervention scripts. At the close of the training, a series of free Internet resources are reviewed that schools can use for intervention planning and assessment.

He is the creator of Intervention Central (www.interventioncentral.org), a popular website featuring free student intervention ideas. Jim has over 17 years experience working in public schools.
