Getting Real about Race

On October 4, I had the pleasure of working with ALANA upper-level peers as a co-student facilitator for the Combating Campus Racial Incidents workshop. Given the infamous doll incident and other incidents that have happened at Canisius recently, the 2-hour workshop was very much needed for those who were affected (directly and indirectly), as well as bystanders. It was a moment for us to pause, think, and really reflect on how we encounter race relations in our daily lives and what we should do if we are faced with micro-aggressions and racial tension. Over 90 students were able to be vulnerable about their opinions and how they felt incidents had been handled in the past. Suggestions from students included the college having more faculty of color, and encouraging faculty/staff to experience a racial diversity competency workshop. Panelists such as Charita Price/Counseling Center, and Olivia Owens/Undergraduate Student Association, extended their support to help students be active and responsible for how they handle situations that can be intense. College President John Hurley facilitated a roundtable discussion with students. The overall gathering was fittingly facilitated by Prof. Craig Rogers of the Dept. of Economics and Finance. Congratulations to McSteve Ezikeoha '19 for demonstrating persistence for three semesters to make this workshop on race relations unforgettable. While I persisted into the following semester with a 2.0 GPA, my GPA would've been higher if I had utilized campus resources (i.e. tutoring, etc.) regularly. I majored in Communications with a concentration in Television Production. My goal was to work in the entertainment industry as a TV reporter. I joined CCTV (now Griffin TV) in my first year and became the president of the club in my junior year until I graduated in May 2012. I loved every second of the experiences. However, I was inspired by my support network on/off campus who went above and beyond to address

academic, professional, and personal concerns I faced. My father died in March 2010 and my mother almost died my last semester. My support network ensured that I would graduate from college. Thanks to them, I have a bachelor's degree in Communications. Furthermore, I proudly changed career paths with no hesitation or regrets. I have worked within higher education for the past six years helping hundreds of students overcome obstacles like mine in and beyond the classroom. I currently work at CUNY's Bronx Community College as an Academic Advisor in A.S.A.P (Accelerated Studies in Associate Programs) and am currently a member of the Canisius Alumni Association.
